What began as an attempt to raise the standard of chiropractic more than 30 years ago is now officially free of the regulation of that Board in Oklahoma. "Oklahoma State Board of Chiropractic Examiners v. Tammy Joy Kennedy" was quietly decided on June 3, 2008 by the Honorable Tom L. Newby, Associate District Judge for Garfield County. The 30 day window for appeal has now officially closed as of July 3, 2008, and what has been called a major victory for health freedom in the United States by Clinton Miller, a key member of the "National Health Freedom Coalition" based in St. Paul, Minnesota, was finally realized.

NSIR which stands for Nerve Signal Interference Removal is the brain child of Dr. Earl Franklin Craton, original researcher of "Nerve Signal Interference (NSI)". Dr. Craton was published many times in his life in an effort to help the people through his old alma mater, chiropractic. He won the Texas Chiropractic College's (TCC's) Centennial Award in 1995 and yet very few chiropractor's (and none yet in Oklahoma) have actually studied with him, or Tammy Kennedy, his granddaughter and chosen successor.

Dr. Craton's life's research has been shown to have a very beneficial affect on a myriad of symptoms that do not respond favorably to other standards of care. In that health freedom in Oklahoma has not yet been totally realized, to date, by the people of this state it is Tammy Kennedy's intention to continue to offer NSIR to the people of Oklahoma in the Enid area. She now makes house calls.

Her knowledge of the areas of her expertise is impressive, and in the spirit of her grandfather, she winks first when asked to prove her point. She says with a smile that the people are entirely capable of understanding the tools and intentions of her trade.
